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Editorial


Here we are already in November, the last month of our church year. Advent is just around the corner. It might seem a bit early to think about Advent, but I hope you'll bear with me as I find it easier to reflect on Advent before I'm caught up in the busyness of a New Zealand Advent with Christmas fast approaching.

What do you think of when you think of Advent? As well as Advent calendars, to-do lists, deadlines, services, carols, cooking, food and presents, in recent years I've realized how much reading children's Christmas books has become an important part of my Advents. I love to read and reading helps me slow down. Advent is after all, a time of slowing down in order to wait and prepare for the birth of the Christ Child, and the length of children's stories suits my attention span in Advent.

Each Advent I put my basket of kids' Christmas books in the lounge where I can sit in the summer afternoon sun with a cuppa and read. Most Christmases one or two more books are added to my collection – ones I've either found myself or have been given as gifts. This tradition has crept up on me over the last 30 or so years since our children were young and I enjoy the inscriptions or cards

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glued into them, such as that in *The Nativity*, that I inscribed 28 years ago, "For Helen from Mummy and Daddy 10/91." This book therefore doesn't really belong to me but I'm looking after it for Helen in the meantime.



I'm a bit choosey about which books are worthy of being in my collection, but even so the books I have are quite diverse. Many books such as *Humphrey's First Christmas* and *Room for the Little One* are about the birth of Jesus of from the point of characters that don't appear in the Biblical stories of Christmas, yet they offer new insights. I have half a dozen or so New Zealand books including *Hettie's Christmas Gift*, an inspired story set in a contemporary,

summery, New Zealand Christmas about the point of Christmas.

Most of these books are picture books and, as well as the words, the illustrations can be a source of reflection offering; as Thomas

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Moore put it, "subtle nuances that address the imagination and not just the rational mind". Take *Humphrey*, for example, with its glorious faces of a self-pitying cantankerous camel that can't but help take me along with him. He reminds me that transformation can happen to people (and camels) in the most unlikely ways; and the "illuminations", script and let alone the story of *Brother Egbert's Christmas* remind me that the Christmas story has been told – and needs to been retold – for people and places down through the ages. A few, such as *The Nativity* illustrated by the Australian Julie Vivas (complete with angels in workboots and Joseph helping a heavily pregnant Mary onto the donkey) and Pienkowski's *The First Christmas* are simply straight tellings of the Biblical story of the birth of Jesus, but with different and original illustrations that bring new perspectives on the Nativity story and bring it to life.

I also have a few adult books about Christmas on our shelves, including Thomas Moore's *The Soul of Christmas* (2016). I like how he talks about Christmas being for all people, not just Christians, since Jesus and Christmas are both about love, community, friendship, hope and the opportunity to try out a new and different way of life. I find this helpful as our society increasingly secularises and sidelines Christmas from Christmas festivities and holidays.

When discussing reading during Advent, Moore reflects on paintings of Mary the mother of Jesus in which she is holding a book, as she is told by the Angel Gabriel that she is to become the mother of the son of God (although I'm pretty sure Mary doesn't have a book in the Biblical story). As he says, reading can help us prepare, to be "spiritually pregnant" and he has realised that, for him, "[i]f some new life possibility is going to be born in me, it will probably happen when I am reading."

When I come to think of it, most of the books in my collection are about people (or occasionally camels or cats or wombats) having experiences at Christmas that transform their worldview, whether or not they are Christian, or understand what Christmas is about. And they are stories of hope, that precious commodity that is much needed in our world. Reading children's Christmas stories remind me that there are endless ways of finding meaning, if only I would slow down. I think I could go so far as to say that reading kids' Christmas books has become a type of spiritual practice for me. It makes me wonder what others might do during Advent to help themselves slow down and prepare for Christmas. I do hope you'll tell me.

I wish you a reflective Advent as we wait once more for the birth of the Christ Child.

- What a treat it was to have children help serve communion on World Communion Sunday. The looks on their faces showed they understood they were participating in something special and sacred.
- Thank you to Gregor Macaulay for leading worship on 13 October while our minister Margaret was on leave. The service was based on the hymns of John Mason Neale and Catherine Winkworth, who each translated into English or composed around 400 hymns. Some of these are still well known today, such as O Come, O Come, Emmanuel, translated by Neale, and Now Thank We All Our God, translated by Winkworth.
- Thank you to Andrea Clarke who has just finished on the Christian Development Committee after more than eight years. Her contribution has been much appreciated.
- The Christian Development Committee is looking at how we can best meet our young children's needs on a weekly basis.
- The proposed discussion night on the End of Life Choice Bill at Opoho was not able to go ahead.
- The national church has a Child Protection Policy with a warrant of fitness training programme for all those who work with young people under the age of 18. Judy Rodda has already taken this, and others from Opoho will do so in due course. This training is available online and it is hoped that Opoho will host a training session using the online material in the near future. Judy Rodda and Mary Somerville have been jointly appointed as Child Safety Officer. They will be the "go to" people for ongoing practice and any suggestions or concerns.
- The Parish Council has appointed John Somerville as Church Safety Officer to make sure that health and safety matters are properly attended to (it is a requirement from the national Church for every parish to have such an officer).

Property and Finance Update

I said I would report every three months on giving and have the happy news that offerings are just above the budget line for the first time in 10 years. This may partly be a timing aberration with some larger offerings coming in, and time will tell, but for the moment we can celebrate!

Looking around the property, we keep on finding more things that need attention, although some recent achievements have been

- the repair and painting of the wall in the hall previously occupied by the bowling club signs;
- a start made to a garden plot next to the garage with a request to the congregation for sponsors for some sleepers (already two spoken for out of three needed) and soil;
- a productive working bee in September.

We have begun to look at what we might do to reduce the steady loss of grit from the roof tiles (which then fills the spouting), improving drainage at the back of the hall, taking a modem into the back of church, and painting the hall ceiling and church dormers. Repairs to the rotten areas of the south-facing church windows are to be undertaken by a builder.

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Lastly, we are getting to grips with documentation and policies around health and safety and will be looking for a nominated person to take the role of Health and Safety Officer with the responsibility to do a monthly check of a small list of important things – e.g. exit doors not obstructed, chemicals out of reach of children, etc. More on that later.

In the meantime, thanks to all who contribute in so many ways to keeping things ticking over

#### Interfaith Matters

We now begin Interfaith meetings with the host faith teaching us a little from their tradition.

Although October's meeting was held at the Baha'i Centre, the Hindu Temple Society was the host. Consequently Srivan opened with a prayer in Sanskrit, which he also gave in English. Luxmanan Selvarasan then explained that the Hindu Temple Society in Dunedin has been set up by Hindus from various places, so different branches have come together "under one roof" with the freedom to celebrate their own beliefs and to learn and to teach. In Lux's words "Dunedin is small so we can do a revolution", not possible "at home".

Links between peace and spirituality are the important basis of Hinduism with peace and love being the key words. Because as yet the Hindu group doesn't have a physical temple, the Baha'i Centre has lent their place of worship, important for the celebration of Puja (prayer ritual). The Baha'i community regard themselves blessed to be able to do this. Lux's talk was followed with questions and comments.


A question about the swastika symbol clarified for us that the Hindu symbol is the opposite way around from the Nazi symbol, and it is very early - even in ancient Babylonia - so has no links with the Nazi one.

Hinduism does have links with both Hari Krishna and Brahma Kumari, who, respectively, focus on Krishna and Shiva. Diversity within Hinduism is important as is diversity within India - one could say the question is not "do you believe in God?" but rather "which God do you believe in?" I find it hard to decide whether to use a capital G or a small q – but therein lieth the question of diversity.

#### Icons

When Gregor Macaulay took the service on 13 October, the children's talk was about icons, the pictures of saints or Biblical characters or events that are seen in Greek and Russian Orthodox churches. For sound reasons, Protestants do not normally go in for icons – they can become a focus for superstition – but they are often beautiful works of art and can be a reminder of our forebears in faith. Gregor handed out copies of various modern icons to children and adults in the congregation who shared names



congregation who shared names with the saints depicted, and some generic pictures to those whose names don't have a matching saint.

Operation Cover Up

Any time of the year is the right time to make knit squares and/or sew them into blankets.

Please use wool, not synthetic, as wool has more warmth.

Cast on 40 stitches in double knitting, knit 40 rows (or 20cm) in garter stitch and cast off. For other wool weights adjust to make 20 x 20cm squares.

A bag at the back of the church is topped up with wool if you need some.
