Editorial

As for most of you, Christmas cards with snow and glitter, and robins and red-robed choristers were part of my childhood, even though immediately after Christmas we would be packing our togs and shorts and sunhats to head off camping.

Don and I were in Wellington last week while we attended a Presbyterian conference. Like Dunedin, Wellington has some tree-lined streets. In Wellington, the tree of choice is the hardy pohutukawa. They are just starting to come into flower. Over the next weeks, in the lead-up to Christmas, the streets and bush-covered hillsides all over the region will be patched with red-crimson red, rather than the scarlet of our own beautiful rata. In Wellington, the pohutukawa truly signals the approach of Christmas. When we lived there it was the first flowers of the pohutukawa, rather than the neighbourhood Christmas lights, that made me pause and think, ‘Ah, we are at that time of the year again.’

And I love ‘that time of the year.’ I love the stories at the heart of the Christian celebration. The joyful, hopeful, awkward, audacious story of God coming to live among us in Jesus Christ. I love that it is an unashamedly human story. There is the birth of a baby at the centre of it, a little boy who will need to be looked after and loved. I love too that, after God, it is the women who take the lead in these stories. They are the ones responsible for grounding the plans of God, for bringing them to birth.

And in our own Kiwi celebration of the season, I look forward to the gatherings, at church, with family and friends and others. I look forward to carols by candlelight and hush, to starry summer nights and being outdoors on long warm, summer days. (This year I am looking forward to our community carol sing, *Sing Your Heart Out*, on the afternoon of 11 December.)

All of these things, along with the rich memories of past Christmases, come together in that ‘Ah, we are at that time of the year again.’ Dunedin doesn’t have much pohutukawa to herald Christmas and there are no big rata near our place, but I made a discovery when I walked past St John’s Roslyn yesterday. It was windy and all over the footpath there were leaves in red and green and gold – beech leaves. An advent moment on the streets of my neighbourhood!

May God grant you your own reminders of the coming Christmas season and all that is important in it, and may God use your actions and words to herald to others the hope, peace, joy, and love that flow from the Christmas story.

Property and Finance Committee

Presbytery Report

Presbytery met at the Cromwell and Districts Presbyterian Church on 4 and 5 November. Central Otago is where the thyme grows, and it doesn't really stand still – it is buffeted by the wind. Southern Presbytery is also buffeted by the winds of time, how much longer do we have?

A congregation such as Opoho where the same numbers continue to come back might be beginning to look healthy.

When Southern Presbytery meets there's a wide range of people: and yet we sit together around tables to eat, discuss and make decisions.

Paul Trebilco told us about the house church at Colossae who sang the hymn in Colossians chapter one – perhaps a group about twenty people who met in a back room, under pressure from the society around them – maybe something familiar to Southern Presbyterians?

Our second speaker, Susan Jack, the Southern Medical Officer of Health, told us about her life in the mission organisation Servants to Asia's Urban Poor, and reminded us that we will receive family, houses and fields, and trouble in this life – this is something Southern Presbyterians may have to get used to.

Jordan Redding introduced the Presbytery to Eco-Church, which includes Knox, Flagstaff and Opoho and led us in honouring the anniversary of Parihaka, which has a legacy in Otepoti Dunedin.

Kerry Enright addressed us as a Presbyterian member of Presbyterian Support Otago in light of the accusations of abuse in care that are directed against Presbyterian Support Otago and the Presbyterian Church.

It is hoped that his statement to Presbytery will be made available; if so, we will put it on our community noticeboard.

Robin McPhail introduced the Presbytery to the International Rural Churches Association and their next in-person conference at Dubuque Iowa.

Ministry Committee tells us that we have a decreasing number of National and Local Ordained Ministers, and that one of best ways to discern if a person has a calling to ministry is to tap them on the shoulder.

Property Committee tells us that the Synod Road Show is coming up, and if we are interested in the future of our buildings it sounds like a good thing to send Property and Finance Committee people to.

There are churches with structural problems in their buildings and their electrical wiring, and there are questions about buildings in the future of our mission.

At the moment the Presbyterian Church is about congregations who meet in buildings, what will the future bring?

This business meeting of Presbytery under Central Otago blue skies and sun was about the work of Presbytery, and we will meet again in a plenary session in May 2023.

Interfaith Matters



Recently we had the Week of Prayer for World Peace which included a meaningful gathering up at the Mornington Methodist Church. Following this, the spiritual theme at the next Interfaith meeting was to be Connection. At the time I didn't link the two, but then I coincidentally came upon a wonderful article in the independent Catholic magazine, *Tui Motu*, by Christopher Longhurst, called *Praying Together*. A picture showed the present pope, Pope Francis, praying

with leaders of very different faiths, probably taken at a three-day religious summit which he attended in Kazakhstan in September of this year.

The article talks of prayer being “the ultimate spiritual act as it initiates a rapport with God and other spiritual beings through intentional engagement. When people of different faiths pray together, they ultimately unite in mind, heart and soul. They are in spiritual communion.....

“When religiously diverse people pray together, the long history of religious disunity is momentarily mended and the goal of religious unity is closer.

“In practice, praying together goes beyond interreligious dialogue. It is the highest form of interfaith relations as it forms part of the realm of interspiritual communion which can trigger interior transformation.

“According to Pa Henare Tate (a past Catholic leader), ‘persons in communion are changed in the act of knowing and loving each other’.”

There was the theme of Connection surely. So in the Opoho Presbyterian Church – sure we are of similar faith – may we work to build communion i.e. connection, between us all as we pray, just as we experienced at the Interfaith gathering at the Mornington Methodist Church not long ago.



First Church *of* Otago

*The following is adapted from a 2018 Advent reflection by Justin Welby,
Archbishop of Canterbury.*

Advent is the season when we wait and prepare ourselves to celebrate the coming of Christ. Each of us will have different experiences of waiting this Advent – from joy and excitement, to anxiety and sadness. But who we are waiting for is the same. We are waiting for Jesus, who brings each of us hope, healing, comfort, forgiveness, guidance, renewal, and love. Throughout the Bible, the prophets tell us that waiting is part of how we make space in our hearts for God. This Advent, may we have the courage to wait, the faith to know what we are waiting for – and the grace to receive what God has in store for us.
