*Editorial*

This time a year ago, Abby and I, as well as an American colleague of mine, Diane, were sitting on our deck enjoying the afternoon sun, talking about a scary new disease, COVID-19, which was spreading rapidly around the world. Little did we suspect that within two weeks, we would be subject to an unprecedented lockdown, confined to our homes in single-household “bubbles,” allowed out only for essential single-person trips to the supermarket or doctor and exercising around the neighbourhood. Diane “escaped” back to Boston on one of the last flights out of Auckland, and we all learned how to use Zoom, marvelling at how much better it was than Skype. Abby’s family instigated weekly video calls; ironically, we ended up knowing more about the family’s day-to-day doings than we ever did before, just as they become substantially less exciting!

Fast-forward to today, and the world is a very different place, but not at all what I had foreseen. I had expected people on our street to be sick, relying on neighbours for supplies. I had not expected New Zealand to have largely eliminated the virus, especially after there

were active cases right here in our city. I hadn’t expected vaccines to be developed so fast or so successfully.

We have much to be grateful about in our country, for we really have avoided the worst of it. Diane caught COVID last November and was seriously ill. Some members of Abby’s family have not touched another person for weeks at a time. Another of my American colleagues describes her and her husband’s house as “messy, possibly even dirty”, even though there is ample time to make it spotless; they do not have the motivation to do anything. And, of course, millions around the world have died, often in quite awful circumstances, forcibly isolated from family and friends.

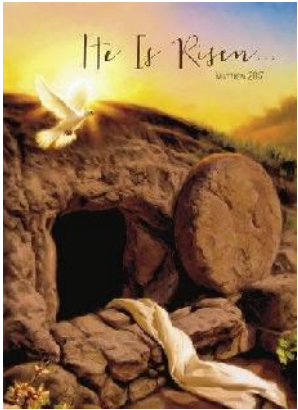
All the same, we are not unscathed. We all have this constant threat hanging over us, that the virus might break through our border and run rampant through our communities. The economic impacts of lockdowns have been severe for many people, although, as so often happens, it seems the rich have become richer. The flood of horrifying news from overseas is depressing and seemingly unstoppable.

In all of this, the support of friends and our wider community has been critical. Our church community has been a lifeline for many of us. We all have stories like mine above (and, indeed, possibly worse) that sharing somehow makes more bearable. Humans are social animals and the impact of COVID on our social lives is felt by every one of us. It is interesting that some of the most successful messaging around prevention (“Be kind”) emphasises this sociality, rather than anything to do with the infectivity of the virus.

And what happens now depends so much on societal decisions. The effectiveness of the vaccine depends critically on a social contract: we need the majority of the population (at least 70%, I read) to be vaccinated in order to stop the pandemic and protect those who cannot be vaccinated (say because of a compromised immune system). Margaret Thatcher once said that there was no such thing as society; I remember being unconvinced at the time, but it is oh-so-clear today that she was flat wrong.

Scottish poet William Jeffrey was born in 1896 at Kirk of Shotts, Lanarkshire, the son of a colliery manager. He was educated at Wishaw High School and attended the Universities of Glasgow and Edinburgh before his education was interrupted by service with the Royal Artillery during World War I. After being gassed on the Western Front, he turned to journalism in 1920, working for the Glasgow Evening Times and later the Glasgow Herald as a leader-writer and drama critic. He died in 1946.

*Parish Council and Church News*

Congratulations to Gisela Andrew, who celebrated her 90th birthday on 18 March.

The World Day of Prayer service on 5 March has been described (by someone who has attended many many World Day of Prayer services) as “the best I have ever attended.” Thank you to Fiona Stirling for coordinating and leading the service, to David Murray for the music, and to Mary Somerville, Bronwen Strang and Christine Cleugh who all took part.

Thank you to everyone who turned up for the garden working bee on 6 March.

The Parish Council met on 18 March and received with regret the resignation from the Council and the Christian Development Committee of one of the more active and busy members of the congregation. Mary Somerville is stepping down from the Council and the Committee but staying heavily involved with her other responsibilities and leadership roles. We appreciate all the work to which she is committed.

The Rev. Silvia Purdie sent out an open letter to the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand about climate change. It is something that Opoho Parish Council and congregation are thinking about, and we are grateful that Jane Anderson reports back to the parish on our behalf. Silvia has been invited to take our Sunday service on 16 May.

Our OK Kids is a small group now and we value all our children and families who attend.

Parish Council decided to recognise the arrangement with Philip Somerville and Gregor Macaulay as Parish Clerk and Associate Parish Clerk respectively, and will review the arrangement six months after the appointment of a minister to the parish. Not every parish has a Gregor who handles minute taking and administrative detail and we are grateful for that luxury!

Parish Council has received the suggestion that Community Time could be rotated amongst members of Parish Council. Many

members of the congregation are involved in our weekly worship with music, children’s talks and notices.

Giving is down and it may be that many people are at their maximum with faithful donations.

The Ministry Settlement Board reports that they are in conversation with a potential candidate for ministry to Opoho Church and progress is being made.

The Parish Council considered the papers for the nomination of the Moderator-Designate of General Assembly from the Assembly Executive Secretary and decided to put no name forward.

The Council meets again on Thursday 15 April.

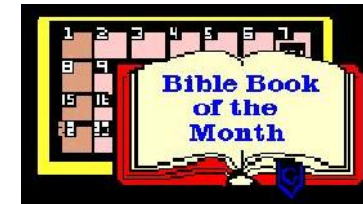

#### *10 Steps to Less Waste in 10 Months*

#### **Step 3) April:** Recycling

(Information on Step 1) *Consider* and Step 2) *Measure* is on the table in the Morrison Lounge.)

**Bible verse:** 1 Corinthians 15:50. *What I am saying is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.*

#### **'Big Idea'**

God designed all of Creation to be perishable, but modern manufacturing has created millions of objects that are effectively imperishable. Plastic is designed to degrade so slowly to be almost immortal. True immortality is found only in God. All else is idolatry. Objects that do not decompose harm the environment. Recycling reduces this harm.

#### **Question** – *for reflection and discussion*

What do we do with objects whose life span is much longer than ours?

#### **Action Steps for April**

Help your City Council recycle as much as possible:

- know what can go into the yellow recycling bins (find out from your City Council)
- don't put anything else in the recycling bins
- don't wrap recycling in plastic bags
- clean recycling first.

Buy less stuff in plastic bottles – refill and re-use.

Ask for no plastic packaging when you buy products (such as polystyrene).

Get creative. What ideas do you have for re-using stuff?
