Editorial – The Shortest Day

Winter is a-coming in, and we can certainly feel it. Daylight is disappearing and the sun, when it does shine, has little warmth in it. We become disinclined to go out — especially at night. Some mornings are frosty and slippery underfoot. Inside is where we want to be.

Yet the wintry outdoors has its appeal. The sparkly cold air is invigorating. The trees who dropped their leaves in autumn are now bare branches etched against a white sky. And sometimes among the skeletal silhouette we can see a surprising clump of greenery.

That's mistletoe.

Mistletoe is a semi-parasitic plant that inserts a tap into its host tree and helps itself to water and nutrients, while still doing its own photosynthesis. The plants are there all year long, but we see them best when the leaves of the host trees are gone.

New Zealand mistletoes (of which there are eight species now) only barely resemble their UK kin. Several kinds have bright showy flowers and pretty berries. Some of them are very attractive to birds (and possums). Our native mistletoes grow very slowly and are generally considered not to cause any harm to their host plants.

Look up! As soon as you've noticed one mistletoe, they suddenly appear all around you. They were there all the time – green and thriving in plain sight – but we missed them till winter came and removed some of the distracting foliage.

Is there a metaphor here? Could we use winter's quiet nights by the fire to look at our lives and see what important things we have overlooked? Here in the temperate realm, where seasons are strong and winter is cold, we are given a time of contemplation. What will we do with it?

There was a lot to work through in this meeting and we did it in record time.

Our 2023 budget is tracking well and we have on our calendar to allocate July for 2024 budget planning ready for the AGM.

We have received a letter from the Presbyterian Insurance Advisory Group reinsurance new cover options (cost increases for sure) and Ōpoho Church will need to make a decision on their cover level by 23 June. This will be the focus of our June meeting.

On a more cheering note, a garden tap has been installed on the back wall of the church, additional electrical plugs are in the minister's office. You may have

noticed half the paths are water blasted (work in progress), the back hedge has been trimmed, some new garden plantings and the noticeboard is under repair.

We plan to replace perished window opening cords around the building. We are trailing a new spreadsheet to capture hall. Please let us know if you have ideas or issues that we need to consider.

Plant of the Month - Mexican Orange Blossom (Choisya ternata "Aztec Pearl")





This new addition to the back garden (behind the children's room) has a bit of history. Given to Miriam, as a gift. It lost its name tag and was perilously close to being unloved at my back door. As lifesaving resort, it planted over at the church in a plot that our neighbour Michael had offered to care for. Michael spotted it immediately and, on a dog walk, commented to me it Choisya ternata was a "Aztec Pearl"

perfect for the spot but just needed to be moved slightly to maximise the space available.

Michael shifted the plant and emailed me a link with the following information:

How to grow Mexican Orange Blossom (Choisya ternata "Aztec Pearl")

"Aztec Pearl" is an evergreen shrub grown for its attractive foliage and pleasant flowers. The foliage comprises lush and glossy, dark green leaves which release a mild fragrance when crushed. The foliage is complemented with showy clusters of fragrant, white flowers through spring and summer. It grows compactly with a rounded shape to about 1.5 m tall and the same wide, performing best when planted in full sun or partial shade on a well-drained, sheltered site. It is tolerant of dry periods and moderate frost once established. This popular and low maintenance plant is commonly included in mixed plantings and borders, planted around outdoor living areas, grown as an informal hedge, or used to brighten up a bland area. It also makes for a lovely accent to entranceways.

I look forward to giving updates on its progress. You can check it out with a walk around the back.

Arts-Based Contemplation Series

On Sunday 21st May we concluded this short contemplation series with a visit to the Dunedin Public Art Gallery. This provided those that were able to attend an opportunity to observe both the works of art that we had been contemplating over the previous four weeks as well as our own personal responses to them.

The personal response was the focus of the series. Participants were invited to slow down and notice what emerged as they looked and observed a selected piece for a sustained period in silence. People were encouraged to quieten their critical or intellectual faculties and notice any feelings, memories or sensations that became apparent in response to the image.

People commented how they both enjoyed and were challenged by the experience of calming their mind through the intentional focus of observing an

image and their response to it. This response was often enlarged when it came time to share what people had observed and noticed within themselves. At the gallery I commented how intriguing the contemplative relationship between the image and what emerges within is - an active and alive process with a static image.

Some reflections from participants in the group included:

"Loved the slow down and just looking. The group focus helped me hold my attention, then everyone's sharing opened up aspects I had not seen and also the sharing told us much about each other."

"The contrasts between the different images we looked at was striking. [The] suggestion to be still and observe our feelings about the image was extremely helpful and rewarding."



"An alternative form of contemplation offering a different way to gather together - very enjoyable."

It has been a wonderful experience putting this series together from a simple idea of how observing art might encourage reflection. I thank my sister, Philippa, for generously gifting me the contemplative process that formed the structure for the series. Thanks also to all those that came along and added to the experience by entering into the kaupapa and sharing so freely. Coming together for lunch at a local cafe following the gallery visit was a fitting way to mark the completion of the series.

Interfaith Matters

I felt richly blessed when 8 of us from our congregation came to the Interfaith meeting last month held in the Morrison Lounge. Very wise things were shared by participants under the spiritual theme of God. All comments really are worth sharing but room would be a problem, so I have chosen to pass on what Simon Rae shared with us...

"Our ways of thinking about God and expressing our faith change over our lifetime. I have come to a point, after years of study and teaching, where I find the simple Jewish affirmation of God, as 'The One who is/is becoming' 'The One who will be what this One will be', is sufficient to hold together the sense of God as living presence (which I have had all my life) and the immense mystery of God. This is much more helpful than the western philosophical references to a (static) 'One Who Is', or an 'unmoved-mover' and the like. Islam warns us not to go too far in our religious expression - centuries of speculation have left Christians with 'dogma' about many things that have no foundation - I mentioned the recent Papal retraction of the status of 'Limbo' as an example. Perhaps it is a sign of my age that I am comfortable now with a more minimalist theology.
