Editorial

The first decorations went up in our street two weeks ago - two large cubes draped as presents, and a blow-up Santa, at least my height. They come with solar batteries and light sensors to light them up at night. We are not great fans, but we were neighbourly enough to return one of the cubes to the property, when the northwest wind blew it onto the footpath.

The Christmas chocolates have appeared in large quantities at the supermarkets. It is not quite Advent. (It's the season of pre-Advent, someone quipped at church the other day.) Yet these appearances are less wide of the mark than the hotcross buns I spotted at the supermarket bakery a fortnight ago. Even with foods special to a particular festival, it seems that eating seasonally is not a priority.

Those buns are an illustration of the way that a strongly commercial culture disconnects a thing from its context and in doing so empties it of meaning. So, the only meaning that matters is that this is something that people like and we can produce it and make money out of it.

I found it very interesting and encouraging that one of the strong messages coming from Māori leaders about Matariki, our new national holiday, was that it should not be commercialised. That it is about whanau, pause, remembrance, and refreshment. It is not often that we hear a rebuff of consumer culture on television.

The push to create a sense of need around all sorts of things that are not very necessary at all is no more in keeping with the Christmas story than it is with Matariki. At its core, this story of world-changing significance turns on one very small thing, the birth of a little, vulnerable baby. The commercial take on

Christmas is that more and more *is* more. But less is more in the Christmas story of the gospels. It is the gospel story that holds the lasting wonder and heralds the deep hope for all who live on earth.

Grace and peace to you and your whanau at this joyful time.
