

Opoho People News

We were very saddened by the untimely death of Alan Cloughley in December. His memorial service at Opoho was full of colourful stories, laughter and tears. He had been a willing and tireless worker around the church and he and his friendly manner will be much missed. Please hold Pam and Meegan Cloughley and their family in your prayers.

It was a pleasure to welcome Julie-Ann and Philip Fleming into membership of Opoho Church in December.

We received a card from the Rev. Dr Susan Jones in December. Susan was minister of Opoho Church from 2005 to 2009, and had just retired from active ministry. She was writing to parishes in which she had served to thank them for all she had learned and received while there. She wrote "Opoho was the most suburban church I worked in and that close-knit community feel was one of the good characteristics of the church that we enjoyed. Music and creativity were never far from the surface and worship was a joy. I learned heaps from each person ... all good people and all doing their part to keep the community strong." We wish Susan and Roger well in their next phase of life.

Opoho Church News

While none of us wanted to have to say goodbye to Margaret and Mike after their eight years with us, we farewelled them with a feast of riches of food, music, friendship, speeches, singing, and laughter and tears in the last weekend of January. The hall was full with about 70 attending the Saturday evening pot luck dinner; the tables were decorated with flowers, the food was stunning, there was a diversity of speeches, there was a presentation of gifts and flowers to Margaret and Mike (to which parishioners had generously contributed), along with a surprise guest in the form of their daughter Isobel who flew down from Christchurch for the occasion. It was special that Sarah and Rod Mitchell attended the dinner as Sarah has been minister at Knox Church when Margaret was an

intern there, and she had been convener of the Ministry Settlement Board that put Margaret's name forward to the congregation.

In Margaret's final service, she described her journey with us through her choice of songs and spoke to many of them about how they illustrated aspects of her and our journey together. The Music Group was in fine form and it was a real feast of music with room for laughter and the odd tear. There were 68 at this service with several visitors who came to support Margaret. The singing was stunning.

The words of Margaret's psalm *A Retiring Offering* from her final service are printed later in this *Signal*, along with the words of Gregor Macaulay's poem and the farewell song we sang so lustily to Margaret on Saturday evening.

A big thank you to everyone who helped make Margaret's final weekend with us such a lovely tribute to her ministry. We will miss Margaret and Mike, and wish them every blessing as they begin Margaret's retirement.

We hope you can join us for the parish picnic at Fiona and Henrik's place at Tumai on Saturday 14 March, starting from 11 a.m., with a shared pot luck lunch. There is something for everyone there – petanque, kayaks, kite flying, walks, or simply sitting back and enjoying the stunning view in great company. Further details with the directions and about sharing rides will be circulated closer to the time.

Arrangements for 2020 @ Opoho Church

The Southern Presbytery has appointed the Rev. Ed Masters of First Church to be our Interim Moderator while we are without a settled ministry. His role is to ensure that the ministry continues at Opoho through moderating Parish Council meetings, and ensuring that "together with the church council, that the life and work of the parish is maintained and [being] responsible for the oversight of the parish. This includes ensuring the continuation of worship [and] sacraments, Christian education and pastoral care."

The Ministry Settlement Board (MSB) is "a joint committee [of Presbytery and Opoho Church], with membership from the presbytery and the parish. Its function is to do all the work related to making a

new ministry appointment.”

A congregational meeting after worship on 19 January elected Gaynor Haig, Julie Mander, Andrew Smith, and Shona Somerville as members of the Ministry Settlement Board that has the task of selecting a new Minister for Opoho. They join the Rev. Rachel Judge (convener), the Rev. Ed Masters (Interim Moderator), Shona McDonald (Presbytery nominee), and two Opoho Parish Council nominees, David Murray and me.

We are fortunate at Opoho to have many people who are willing to help with taking services and the extra tasks that we will be picking up now. Please uphold these people and their processes, Parish Council and our various committees in your prayers.

Wider Church News

The Southern Presbytery Council News of their meeting of 4 December notes that “the number of MSBs has risen recently and currently stands at 19. There are several more parishes navigating longer term vacancies without an MSB, but with the support of Interim Moderators. This places a significant workload on the Ministry Work Group who form and oversee the MSBs and Interim Moderators. There are 42 parishes with ministry settlements (7 of which are local ministry teams). Not counting the 3 parishes in the act of dissolving we currently have 66 parishes in Southern Presbytery.”

The Moderator of the PCANZ has sent parishes an email about the devastating bush fires in Australia, noting that “... there is a special relationship between the PCANZ and UCA (Uniting Church of Australia), more than any other of our partner Churches. Apart from Uniting Church ministers and congregations working in the local communities, they are also providing disaster relief chaplaincy which is being coordinated nationally. Their community service agencies are also working locally in effected communities.

The Uniting Church has a National Disaster Relief Fund that donations can be sent to, and which donations will be put through for this disaster.

Operation Cover Up

Any time of the year is the right time to knit squares and/or sew them into blankets.

Please use wool, not synthetic, as wool has more warmth.

Cast on 40 stitches in double knitting, knit 40 rows (or 20cm) in garter stitch and cast off. For other wool weights adjust to make 20 x 20cm squares.

A bag at the back of the church is topped up with wool if you need some.
